Message from our President and CEO

The past year has seen Companion Animal Network Australia as active as it's ever been, with several pet-related issues really beginning to gain traction.

The focus on aged care and the needs of an ageing population has allowed us to advocate for greater understanding among aged care facilities of the benefits to helping older people retain their pets. Meanwhile, the challenges facing employers in convincing staff to return to the workplace has elevated the profile of our pets at work advocacy.

About us

Companion Animal Network Australia (CANA) is Australia's peak body for companion animals. We represent the companion animal welfare work of our six member agencies.

Through national campaigns, partnerships and initiatives, CANA advocates for the human-animal bond and responsible pet ownership. With the help of our members, industry partners and the public, we compile real data to share and inform.

We lobby government and industry to drive positive change for companion animals and the people who care for them.

We help our members achieve the highest possible standards and **facilitate their collaboration in activities that identify and communicate best welfare practice.**

Adoptions and fostering are the core of what our members do. **Our network has found homes** for millions of animals that have been surrendered and neglected but we always have thousands more awaiting adoption.

From AWLA to CANA

The minutes of a meeting of various animal welfare leagues from across Australia, held in 1992, record a decision to form a national body that would offer a strong representative voice for the existing state-based bodies.

There was unanimous agreement that the body would be named Animal Welfare League of Australia (AWLA). It took until 2007 for this vision to be realised, with the addition of Tasmania (2010) and Western Australia (2014) truly making AWLA a national association.





From AWLA to CANA

In 2022, Animal Welfare League Australia underwent a brand transition that incorporated a new name — Companion Animal Network Australia and a new visual identity.

Our new name better describes our representative role as a national body that unites six state-based member agencies. It also permitted us to create the assertive advertising statement 'Australia CAN' as a powerful lobbying slogan that speaks to positive action and change.

The new logo combines elements of a pet's nose, a heart and a smile to create a friendly and positive brand mark that is simple and memorable.

The new name and logo have been warmly received and will give us a distinctive and consistent identity that can underpin our work in the years to come.



Pet Friendly Aged Care

Pet Friendly Aged Care, an initiative of CANA, was established to highlight the often-catastrophic emotional harm caused when older people are forced to give up their pets upon moving into an aged care home, and to provide a more practical way forward.

As our population ages, solutions to maintaining a high quality of life include finding ways to help ageing people retain their pets. The benefits for keeping older Australians connected to pets include:

- Preventing animals from being needlessly euthanised or surrendered to shelters.
- Maximising the physical and emotional health of our animal-loving older people.
- Promoting the social benefits for communities who welcome pets.

Pet Friendly Aged Care

Pet Friendly Aged Care is lobbying government for pet support to be included in home-care packages. We continue to work with residential care facilities by supplying workable policies and protocols that make pet ownership easier to adopt.

This package was developed in conjunction with Lifeview Residential Care following their highly successful programs running throughout their four (soon to be six) homes in Victoria.

This suite of resources are now available through CANA for all residential aged care to access and adopt in their facilities.

Pet Friendly Aged Care

Bupa and the benefits of pets in aged care

Healthcare company Bupa operates 58 residential aged care homes in South Australia, Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland.

Amanda Grimmer, business development manager at Bupa, says that pet admissions are considered at every Bupa residential facility and permitted with the approval of the general manager.

"Bupa currently has many homes where residents reside with cats, dogs and birds," she says.

Grimmer adds that Bupa is flexible in the way it facilitates the human-animal connection:

"Some of our homes have facility-owned pets who resided in the homes for all residents to enjoy." Bupa has a pet agreement in place for potential residents and their families to sign when entering a facility with an existing pet. The company believes that keeping a pet helps new residents settle and assimilate, with the bonus of bringing an extra friend for existing residents to enjoy.

"Even if language is a problem, everyone can pat a dog," says Lisa Myers, one of Bupa's general managers.

"Their faces light up. There's nothing better than giving an animal a cuddle."

Rent With Pets

Rent With Pets is an online resource created by CANA that encourages landlords and tenants to work together so that more animals can live in responsible, loving rental homes.

Rent With Pets was established to create a bridge between responsible pet owners and the nation's landlords, sharing information that will help them work together for the benefit of companion animals.

CANA's website **rentwithpets.com.au** supplies educational and factual information for landlords, agents and tenants. This includes ideas on being a responsible pet owner and hints and downloadable documents to help tenants applying for properties.

Our goal is to increase the number of pet-friendly rental homes to prevent animals from being euthanised or surrendered to shelters due to difficulty finding pet-friendly rental properties.



Less than 10% of rental properties are advertised as pet friendly.

Jake's story

My name is Jake King and I'm an ex-Royal Australian Navy clearance diver and volunteer for K9 Rescue Group, a non-profit organisation that rescues, treats and re-homes dogs in WA.

We receive on average around 10 to 15 phone calls a week from the public specifically having to surrender their dog due to landlords' blanket "no" to pets. That's not including the pounds in the area we service.

The impact of the crisis is huge. We see families almost daily that have to give up their family pet. Let's start to change how we think and help each other. Even a little change will inject so much goodwill into the community – it has to be a good thing!

Companion Animal Network Rental Law for Renters

VIC

Landlords are only able to refuse if they have permission from the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT).

NSW

According to tenants.org.au there is no term in the Residential Tenancies Act 2010 that prohibits a renter from keeping a pet, or that requires you to ask for your landlord's consent before you keep a pet.

WA

A pet bond is optional and, unlike in other Aussie states, permissible by law - although only one pet bond at a maximum of \$260 is allowed to be charged per property, regardless of the number of pets.

<u>ຊ</u>LD

The property owner must respond to a request for a pet in writing within 14 days, or consent is implied.

The property owner's consent may be subject to reasonable conditions. Rent increase or a pet bond are not reasonable conditions.

TAS

Landlords are not allowed to charge pet bonds. The changes also mean landlords are not permitted to unreasonably reject applications from prospective tenants, on the basis they'll be accompanied by a pet.

ACT

Landlords can only refuse consent on very specific grounds and with the approval of the ACT Civil and Administrative Tribunal.

SA

There will be an option for the tenant to apply to South Australian Civil and Administrative Tribunal if they are not satisfied that conditions imposed by the landlord are reasonable or if they believe their request for a pet was unreasonably refused.

NT

Pet bonds are not allowed.

Tenants in the Northern Territory need to notify the landlord that they want to bring a pet onto the property and the landlord has 14 days to approve or deny the request.

Companion Animal Network Rental Law for Strata

2023

VIC

Meanwhile, the standard or default Victorian strata building rules do not prohibit pets or require advance permission for strata owners and residents to keep a pet in a strata building.

NSW

Blanket up-front bans on animals cannot be imposed.

<u>ຊ</u>LD

Strata bodies are not allowed to have a blanket ban on pets.

WA /ACT /SA /NT

The keeping of pets is at the discretion of the strata council or body corporate.



Pets In Business

With one in five Aussies taking time off the job because of work-related stress and anxiety, it's clear the Australian workforce could benefit from some extra creature comforts.

There has been an increasing trend in recent years for employers to implement pet-friendly workplaces to boost employee morale and productivity. The basis of the concept is that pets are widely understood to improve a person's mood and reduce levels of stress and anxiety.

For a small donation, Pets In Business can set up any company with a branded Pets In Business kit that includes rules and regulations that meet the needs of everyone in the workplace. With some businesses having difficulty convincing employees to spend a greater share of their work hours onsite, a pet-friendly policy could be just the tonic for happier and more productive workplaces.

Pets make Eastern Innovation a happier workplace

Eastern Innovation (EI) is a co-working space in south-east Melbourne with suites, labs and offices for more than 40 future-focused businesses.

We recognised that workers and pets spent a lot more time together during the pandemic, meaning that coming back to the office was likely to be a challenge for many people and their employers.

Accordingly, we collaborated with CANA to produce a pet-friendly policy for the business owners and teams who tenant the region's innovation centre.

The goal was to get people back in the workspace with a robust policy, prepared by a team of pet experts, that created an environment few other flexible working spaces could offer.

"Pets primarily reside in the offices of their owners, and we have wonderful outdoor spaces where they can relax too," says chief executive officer of EI, Allira Cundy.

"We love seeing the smiles on people's faces when a pet comes through the door."

Our members receive funding first, so that donations go directly to support the animals and their care. We then charge an annual membership fee and receive a 10% levy each month to support CANA and our programs.

Workplace Giving Australia

CANA can be supported through the Workplace Giving Australia platform, whereby individuals contribute a small portion of their pre-tax salary to CANA and receive the tax benefit straight away rather than waiting until the end of financial year. Companies then match the donation either in full or in part, giving the company a tax benefit while supporting CANA. We are extremely grateful to our workplace giving corporate partners and their staff for their support.
